

Where can we draw parallels to God's calling to us in this time? Are we willing to explore those parallels and set our hearts and minds on the effort to engage the current context?

I invite you to be in prayer about God's intent for this time. By prayer, I mean more than just words expressed. I mean listen and observe what God is up to in this time. Asking the question, what do you want me to see? What do you want me to do? How might we be your loving presence here?

May the Spirit of Christ lead us and guide us.


