

On Father's Day, the gospel reading was from Luke 8:26-39, the story of the healing of the Gerasene demoniac. Throughout the week, leading up to the reading of the story, Luther Seminary's daily devotion offered reflections on

this story. I found them most interesting and thoughtful. I am sharing a couple of them.

On Thursday, Mary Simonson Clark offered this reflection. Have you been so embarrassed by failure or ashamed over a fault that you wanted to crawl in a hole and pull it in after yourself? I've felt that way! I didn't want anyone to notice me or what I'd done. The cry, "What have you to do with me, Jesus, Son of the Most High God?" (v. 28), reveals painful shame, fear, and despair. Jesus heard the cry. He chose to notice the man, stop, and ask, "What is your name?" (v. 30). Jesus demonstrated that seeking someone's name may lessen their embarrassment or shame and show genuine concern. Jesus compassionately calls us by name when he chooses us to become his siblings. With Jesus' call, God saves us from separation's abyss (v. 31). God doesn't leave us hiding in a hole. Instead, God chooses to crawl in the hole alongside us to restore us into relationship with Godself.

Then on Saturday, she shared this reflection. Send Me, Jesus (ELW 549)

This South African hymn's first verse, "Send Me, Jesus," resonates with the sentiment of the man Jesus healed in our current gospel lesson, Luke 8:26-39. The Gerasene man begged to leave his home to join Jesus' journeys. The second verse, "I am willing," recalls the man's response to Jesus. He chose to willingly obey Jesus' command, "Return to your home, and declare how much God has done for you" (v. 39). The man's obedient choice also reminds us of guidance from South African Archbishop Desmond Tutu (1931-2021). He advised, "Do your little bit of good where you are; its those little bits of good put together that overwhelm the world." The man returned home to do his bit of good by declaring the story of how Jesus healed him. God also chooses each of us—wherever we are—to share our unique gifts by doing our little bit of good.

I am grateful that God comes alongside of me bringing healing and wholeness. As Jesus sent the man back home, you and I are sent to our homes and community to share all the goodness that God has done for us. This means sharing kindness, love and acceptance. May the presence of Christ enable this in your life and mine.

What has God done for you?

I shared my testimony how a number of years ago, I had been suicidal and was driving 90 mph down the interstate. I admitted that I'd been trying to figure out how to wreck my car in a way that didn't hurt anyone else and looked like an accident. How I was crying out to the Lord and telling Him that I was done. That the depression was too much for me to take anymore. I was begging Him to show me what my purpose was, or it was all over!

And then I shared how that little beater car had the audacity to pull right in front of me going 60mph. How I had to slam on my brakes not to hit the car. Then, the license plate that read: "SongTree." The word seemed odd to me, and I asked myself, 'What the heck does that mean?' And right then, the Holy Spirit asked me a question in my spirit. "What do a song and a tree need?" And I knew the answer. A songbird. I knew that He was confirming my purpose. To be His Songbird of Hope. To sing and write and praise Him all my days. Precisely when I needed a specific answer from the Lord, more so than ever before in my life, He answered me. Me. His answer shocked me back to life, rang clear and true all the way through my spirit, and still reverberates as I write this.

Rev. Judith Ganz shared the following stories:

Lynne Twist shares the time when the Achuar people in Senegal, living in the desert, were desperate for a new water source. Members of the Hunger Project visited them and met with the male leadership to discuss the issue. They then met with the women, who were convinced that there was an underground lake below them. The men agreed to let the women dig for a well and they eventually found water. Twist writes in *The Soul of Money*:

"They wanted our partnership—not handouts, or money, or food—and respect and equal partnership is what we brought. ... the tribe is proud that it was their own people, their own work, and the land they lived on that proved to be the key to their own prosperity."

Perhaps pilgrimage is an even better word than partnership. Pilgrimage can overlook the power differences between North Americans and those we serve, which according to African Catholic priest, Emmanuel Katongole, can bridge the "us and them" divide. Jean Johnson, author of *We Are Not the Hero*, describes her 16 year pilgrimage to Cambodia this way:

"to live with them in such a way that their problems became my problems. In this manner, I wasn't solving their problems; we were solving our problems together on equal footing. I entered their journey to the best of my ability, sojourning with [them] instead of trying to fix them from within my own comfort zone."

As we bridge the cultural divide, there will be times of misunderstanding. It makes it crucial to more intentionally promote open, honest and respectful relationships and communication, bringing humility and deep listening to the table as we seek *together* to find healthy ways to share our wealth in our ongoing response to the call of Christ for our world.

We have the opportunity to share our wealth in support of ministries here in this community and ministries in other parts of the world through ELCA World Hunger Appeal. May we be generous.


2022 has been busy in the life of the pantry. We are steadily serving more clients each month. During the month of May, we served 1,066 individuals compared to 471 individuals last year.

Bishop Eaton issues pastoral message on SCOTUS ruling regarding Roe v. Wade

Dear church,

Whatever personal perspective one might take on the June 24 abortion ruling from the Supreme Court, it is the legal framework in which we now minister, and I wish to speak a pastoral word at this time.

The Supreme Court has voted to overturn Roe v. Wade, removing federal constitutional protection for safe and legal abortion and leaving decisions about abortion law largely to the states. As a result, safe and legal abortion will likely not be accessible in every state. This church's 1991 social statement *Abortion* argues that "the number of induced abortions is a source of deep concern" but teaches that the practice should be legal (pp. 3, 9-10). In other words, "Laws should be enacted and enforced justly for the preservation and enhancement of life, and should avoid unduly encumbering or endangering the lives of women" (p. 9). Overturning Roe v. Wade and placing decisions about abortion regulation at the state level encumbers and endangers the lives of all persons who need to make decisions about unexpected pregnancies.

First, as a pastor of this church, I want to acknowledge that this decision affects many people, especially those whose pregnancies unfold in complex situations and the people who love them. Many now find their moral agency restricted because federal law no longer guarantees access to legal and safe abortion. They already face difficult moral questions, and the Supreme Court decision only adds to their anguish. As our social statement reminds us, we have both the freedom and the obligation to serve neighbors in complex situations. As a church, we are called at this moment to recognize and spiritually support people who are struggling with decisions around pregnancy.

Second, as presiding bishop, I want to remind this church that, despite this new legal landscape, we continue to depend on our social teaching for guidance. Our social statement provides the moral framework for our church's communal discernment and ministry, holding in tension both the strong Christian presumption to preserve and protect all life as well as the complex moral situations in which pregnancy sometimes occurs. Our social teaching is complex and does not hew to clear categories or labels such as "pro-abortion" or "anti-abortion."

That complexity is reflected in several points. The statement recognizes that pregnant persons have moral agency; they are the ones to make decisions about a pregnancy (see pp. 5-6). This church and its ministers trust them to decide but expect them to make such decisions in relationship—with God, self, partner, family, ministers and others.

I also want to underscore for the whole body of Christ the statement's exhortation "that those who counsel persons faced with unintended pregnancies respect how deeply the woman's pregnancy involves her whole person—body, mind and spirit—in relation to all the commitments that comprise her stewardship of life" (p. 5).

Further, our church teaching holds that there are no exclusive rights in pregnancy. A pregnant person does not have an exclusive right to abort a fetus at all points during the pregnancy. A developing life does not have an exclusive right to be born (p. 2). This church does not support abortion as a normative form of birth control but rather understands it as necessary in some morally responsible circumstances. This church does not condone late-term abortions except in extreme circumstances, which must be determined by the individual with their medical caregivers (p. 7).

This church acknowledges that individuals and religious traditions hold divergent viewpoints over when life begins. These divergent views are not only scientific but also biblical and cultural. The ELCA social statement acknowledges these ethical ambiguities and states that "the closer the life in the womb comes to full term the more serious such [moral] issues become." (p. 7).

As we live into this new legal framework, we can respond to and minister in the current situation, for instance, by ministering to individuals who seek abortions; advocating for laws that provide free or affordable health care, child care and education; providing and promoting sex education; continuing to be a community of discernment where thoughtful and diverse perspectives can be shared and heard; and advocating for state laws that provide legal, safe and affordable abortions, and against legislation that would outlaw abortion in all circumstances (p. 9).

Finally, I wish to remind everyone that this church supports peaceful means of expression within a diverse society. Peaceful protest is a crucial element of civic engagement; violent protest is not, and this church reproves it. Likewise, this church is on record against hate speech. Let us be instruments for peace where there is none. Let us listen to one another. Let us serve the needs of neighbors in all the complexities life presents. God calls us to be *for* others, just as God in Christ is for us.
