I enjoyed the time away. We drove to Albuquerque so that I could attend the Fall Gathering of the Voyagers – clergy who actively engage thinking and acting from Bowen Theory in Family and Work. The scenery on the drive

Included in her talk were presentations by two other individuals. Dr. Patrick Stinson who has developed an app that can create a visual form of the generations and the interactions that mark the emotional systems of the family. Allison Whitney, the Western Pennsylvania Family Center Board Chair, presented a very unique look at triangles. Triangles are the building block of larger emotional systems.

We also presented in a small group our Family of Origin. This gives us the opportunity to reflect on the various concepts of the theory. I am amazed at the things I have discovered in exploring my family of origin.

I am grateful for the colleagues that come together and are excellent thinkers and practitioners of this theory. It is good to be grounded with such good people.

The regular meeting of the Council was held on October 11, 2022. Council members shared prayer concerns for an end in the violence occurring in Ukraine, Iran and N. Korea, victims of Hurricane Ian and ongoing natural disasters, Eva's sister Betty who is receiving cancer treatments, daughter Gloria who is dealing with health problems, Brenda's neighbor Tony who is dealing with multiple health concerns, and for much needed rain.

<u>Devotions</u>: Devotions were led by Sarah Emery, reading the selected verses in the "*Daily Texts*" from Deuteronomy 26:15 and Luke 2:30-32. The first talks about tithing in previous verses and continues with asking and praying for God to continue blessing us in all that we do. The second reminds us that Jesus is our light and salvation for ALL PEOPLE.

<u>Visions for Ministry</u>: Council members reflected on an article "It's Time to Rethink American Churches." This revealed through a poll with Gallup the steady decline of Americans that say they belong to a church, synagogue, or mosque. 2020 shows for the first time the percentage is below 50% and now indicates only 47% associate or belong with a church. Majority of people, mostly young adults, are now saying they are not religious but are spiritual, outside of a church building. They are spiritual when and where they choose, but this is done without guidance or leadership. It is good to see folks taking care of and seeking justice for one another.

<u>Committee Reports</u>: Reports were received from the Financial Secretary and the Treasurer. Please continue to give generously.

<u>Christian Education</u>: Pastor concluded the four-week Bible Study on October 4th with three people participating.

<u>Evangelism/Outreach</u>: Crossroads Prison Ministry meal was held on Sunday, September 18th with 22 people in attendance. There was a miscommunication with letting individuals know there was a service. Plenty of food was leftover.

<u>Finance</u>: Council approved an increase to Pastor's Housing Allowance. Pastor will apply for the Immanuel Vision Foundation Grant so we may provide a variety of supplies for the teachers and staff at Liberty Elementary from Grace and Spring Lake Elementary from St. Luke's.

<u>Property</u>: Loren Moyer helped Pastor install a new garbage disposal in the upstairs kitchen. Loren also helped with changing burnt-out light bulbs in the vintage hanging lights in the sanctuary.

Council discussed a leaky refrigerator in the basement which has caused tile damage, should have the refrigerator either repaired or replaced.

Service/Social Ministry: None.

<u>Support/Stewardship</u>: Make It Simple - Fall Emphasis. Additional information will be available in the November issue of the Grace Messenger.

<u>Worship</u>: Council discussed options for Thanksgiving Eve Service and would like to follow up with Pastor and what the Metro East Cluster will be doing. Christmas Eve is on Saturday this year and Christmas is on Sunday. Council decided that it would be best to have one Christmas Eve service at St. Luke's and then Christmas morning service will be at Grace. Two of Grace's council members, Brenda and Janet, will visit with St. Luke's council during their meeting on Thursday and discuss these options.

Council also decided it would be nice during 2023 to switch months with St. Luke's so both congregations could experience worship services in different months.

<u>Unfinished Business</u>: None

<u>New Business</u>: Council discussed and agreed to have a cake reception following worship service on Sunday, October 23rd, in recognition for Pastor Appreciation!

Announcements: Ralph will prepare a prayer for next month.

Adjournment: The Council meeting closed in prayer and adjourned at 8:20pm.

This hunger for more is a true sign that we do not trust the goodness of God to supply all of our needs; we do not trust that the generous rule of Jesus who has ascended to power is in effect. But we, we are Jesus people, and therefore we are pledged and empowered to act differently, differently in the neighborhood, differently in the economy, and as citizens of the last superpower, differently in the world. (Louisville: Westminster John Knox Press, 2007, p. 5)


