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Jon Tyson wrote in an article for Alban Institute: "The end of the year is the perfect opportunity to dream about what's next. Maybe you're already thinking about changes you'd like to see in your organization in the coming year. So much of the change we've experienced lately has been

involuntary: we had to adapt our approach to worship, ministry and fellowship in order to survive. Now that we've survived, it's time to prayerfully discern what God has in mind for the future."

I find these words encouraging. As we close out 2022 and begin 2023, it is a good time to reflect on what we think God has in mind for our future.

Aleta Payne also writes in another article for Alban Institute: Creating our future is a group effort. "How do we regather when we are still frayed, frightened and in some cases irritable? How do we reclaim the soft skills required to be together?

"In response, our first instinct might be to create something new. There is little that church people love to do more than to "fix it," whatever "it" is. (There are also folks who don't mind breaking things, and we're seeing some of that too.) But that first instinct, often out of a combination of love, responsibility and discipleship, is to create what is needed.

"That raises challenges. First, too often in our Western culture, creating is seen as a solitary endeavor, an "I'll fix it myself!" mindset that focuses responsibility and concentrates authority in the hands of one (or a very few). There are obviously times when we create alone, sometimes because the work is personal or because the medium doesn't lend itself to the task of an eager committee.

"But the hierarchical models of many institutional churches can perpetuate the pattern in which a single person takes over work that would be better done by a group.

"Second, we're often focused on re-creating. When we set out to re-create what we had — another option for making the coffee, planning the mission trip or leading the meeting — we presume on some level that nothing has changed and that our way is still the best. "Same pot and brewing system, except it's not.

"Re-creating ignores realities. It glosses over what we've all been through with COVID-19, racial pandemics and political disruption and ignores what remains ahead of us. Rather than building on the hard lessons of the pandemics, it assumes that we're gearing back up to do what we've always done, much as we always have.

"But our world has fundamentally changed.

"Maybe, just maybe, this kingdom season is calling us instead to co-creation — the beautiful, intentional, messy and incremental work of envisioning and growing together. Indeed, it's already happening!"

I find these words refreshing. May our new year be filled with many opportunities to co-create what God leads us toward in our future.

The regular meeting of the Council was held on December 13, 2022. Council members shared prayer concerns for continued recovery for a member who was recently diagnosed with cancer, Andrew, Jackie, Jerry Goodrich, for people to continue receiving their boosters and vaccinations, those affected by wars and violence abroad, and hope that everyone is nicer to one another, "Peace on Earth".

<u>Devotions</u>: Devotions were led by Pastor Laaker, reading the selected verses in the "*Daily Texts*" from Deuteronomy 6:16 and Galatians 6:7. The first tells us that one is not to test God or commit any sins, stay on the path of 'goodness'. The second reminds us that we all fall short, we are not worthy to be saved and we should not mock God, yet God is with us, and our debt has been paid.

<u>Visions for Ministry</u>: Article on Money, mission, and meeting in person – a new study of COVID-19's effect on churches focused mainly on the financial side. Council discussed changes that have been implemented since the Covid outbreak both within the pantry outreach and during worship service. Giving remains close to consistent with the most noted changes being that we no longer pass the offering plate, therefore loose offering has been down.

<u>Finance</u>: A Pantry volunteer fell and is in a full body cast and in rehab. Insurance has been notified; we lift her up in prayer. Council approved Pastor's Housing Allowance for 2023.

<u>Property</u>: Tile pieces need to be replaced or we could replace the tile in the entire basement.

Furnaces are now 24 years old and are starting to show signs of possible carbon leaks, to ensure safety Pastor has placed carbon monoxide detectors in the areas kept warm by the furnaces. We will be replacing systems in the spring or summer.

Families in Action will be moving out of the office space upstairs and may continue to maintain storage space in the basement.

How do our bodies and our worth intersect?

Our relationships with money and bodies not only shape our relationship with God, but impact our relationships with each other. The narratives we tell about our worth intersect with our ability to recognize God's movement in the world. We are unable to imagine what belonging means in the kingdom of God and create structures around these imaginings without decolonizing the relationship between our worth and work.

"The challenge to change from charity to community-based, from mainline to interreligious, from white-dominant to intercultural, from working for the community to serving with and alongside the community is a move that requires acknowledging the structures that perpetrate and perpetuate poverty, xenophobia, and disenfranchisement." – the Rev. Dr. Amaury Tañón-Santos

Dr. Tañón-Santos describes the hard part, right? Our culture is designed to ask what the land will produce and how a person's worth is connected with the profit they produce. The workings of empires are not tied with communitybased, relationship-driven structures. Rather, this economy is often at odds with the kingdom of God where healing comes without consideration of profit gain. Yet, this is not God's story and our hope is in the prophetic made real, in body. In the everyday moment.

This past Advent we awaited Jesus' coming to bring a new kingdom. What does an alternative way of being with and for each other look like in the day to day? It is a prophetic act to claim a new way of being for each other that values people over profit, connection over currency, and belonging over belongings. It is these little prophetic acts, done over and over again, that expose our vulnerable selves to alternative understandings of productivity.

In this way, stewardship is shifted to include how we care for ourselves and for each other.

As we think about shifting structures and new economies, we are reminded that our faith in Christ's coming is rooted in our day to day relationships, in our momentary connections that reflect our hope and liberation for the kingdom that is to come.





Into the Heavens and back

The Risen Christ by the Sea (right) ascended into the heavens on a spacecraft on August 4th and returned to earth.

One of the space tourists on the flight, Steve Young of Melbourne, FL, the former CEO of a telecommunications company, took with him 100 wallet-size prints of the famous painting by artist Jack Jewell. The prints were provided to Young by Paul Berube, a Rockledge, FL, friend who wanted prints that had gone into space.

Young was one of six "space tourists" who made the 10-minute suborbital flight on Jeff Bezos' sixth Blue Origin flight to the edge of space and back at a velocity of 2,239 mph.

From 66 miles above West Texas, the passengers on the supersonic flight unstrapped at the high point of the trajectory and began floating about.

They marveled at the spectacle of earth below and the deep black of space above.

"Oh my God!" one passenger gasped.

The spacecraft's three main parachutes unfurled and inflated, and brought them back safely.

The Risen Christ by the Sea wallet-size cards carry this message from John 15:11: "I have told you this so that my own joy may be in you and your joy may be complete." John 15:11 also appeared on the Certificate of Flight.

The Risen Christ by the Sea was painted by Jack Jewell, a Scituate, MA, seascape artist, at the suggestion of a friend, Rev. Martin Clarke, OFM Cap, a chaplain in the New York Fire Department. Rev. Clarke, a Joyful Noiseletter consulting editor, sought an inspirational painting of a smiling, triumphant Risen Christ.

Jack Jewell donated the original print to The Joyful Noiseletter and it bacame our trademark.

The Joyful Noiseletter has distributed thousands of these prints, which are often used as prayer cards, in the past 30 years.


