

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

I do so appreciate the opportunity I have to participate each Spring and Fall in a week-long continuing education group called Clergy Voyagers. This group has been coming together since 1999 to explore Bowen Family Systems Theory and its application to congregations and leadership by Rabbi Edwin Friedman.

Learning Bowen theory is a life-long effort that requires more than just reading the literature and going to a couple conferences. To continue learning Bowen theory, members of the Voyagers come together to:

- 1) Explore theory and practice through presentations by well-known and respected Bowen theory scholars as well as members of the Voyagers;
- 2) Work on the process of differentiation of self through family of origin groups, and contact with peers;
- 3) Engage in theological reflection through case studies, written works, and theological presentations; and
- 4) Work on pastoral practice through case studies and networking with other pastoral leaders.

The time we spent together this Spring focused on societal emotional process. This describes how the emotional system governs behavior in whole societies. Cultural forces are important in how a society functions but are insignificant to explain the ebb and flow in how well societies adapt to the challenges they face.

For example: It is more difficult for families to raise children in a period of societal regression than in a calmer period. Some practitioners would say this is what we are seeing in society today. A loosening of standards in society increases the difficulty of less differentiated parents like Michael and Martha holding the line with their children. Grace inflation in many schools makes it easier for students to maintain grades with less work. In the litigious climate, schools that try to hold to standards for their students often face lawsuits from irate parents. The prevalence of drug and alcohol abuse adds to parents' worry about their adolescents. The current societal regression is characterized by an increased child focus in the culture. Much anxiety exists about the future generation. Parents are criticized for being too busy with their own pursuits to be

adequately available to their children, both for support and to monitor their activities. When children like Amy report feeling alienated from parents and their values, parents' critics fail to appreciate the emotional intensity that generates such alienation.

Some people advocate for more focus on children by citing the many problems young people have. Using children's problems to justify increased focus on them is precisely what many parents have been doing. Young people's increased problems are part of an emotional process in society as a whole. A more constructive direction would be for people to examine their own contributions to societal regression and work on themselves rather than focusing on the future generation.

The emotional system in which each of us lives is a powerful force. In order to change the impact, I have to focus on what I can learn about who and what and how my family predecessors functioned. In turn, if I don't examine the system in which I was formed, I am determined to repeat it. It also means that I will have to be intentional in my efforts to function in ways that discern who and what and how I wish to be.

Now when we put all of us together in a faith community, the emotional system becomes even more challenging since each of us brings our system with us. All of this is to say that I am grateful for the opportunity to engage in this educational effort with other clergy each Spring and Fall.

Stewardship as Investment

Picking the right starting point for stewardship is vital to get us where we want to go as individuals and as communities of faith.

One possible starting point could be called stewardship as investment. "Give and God will bless you" expresses the same idea, and is reinforced through biblical testimony. When seeking to reassure the disciples who questioned the sacrifice asked of them, Jesus said: "There is no one who has left house or brothers or sisters or mother or father or children or fields, for my sake and for the sake of the good news, who will not receive a hundredfold now in this age ... and in the age to come eternal life" (Mark 10:29-30). The Christian steward is one whose giving will be met by God's giving. However, to use this as a starting point for stewardship can be misleading, if not counterproductive. If we begin by presuming that we give to get, where does that take us? The Reformation erupted over just this issue in the sale of indulgences. Beyond that, if our starting point is "give and be blessed," what happens to stewardship when the giver encounters pain, suffering or deprivation? Does the giving end until life improves? Or, does guilt induce more giving, so as to force God's hand?

Consider two texts, each capable of bringing stewardship to focus and fruition:

First, consider the opening verse of Psalm 24: "The earth is the Lord's and all that is in it, the world and those who live in it." All faithful stewardship begins in that affirmation. All that we have, all that we are, all that is — all belongs to God. Whatever comes into our hands does so as a trust from God. We live in a God-given world. The second verse to consider as a starting point is John 3:16: "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life." All creation is not only God-given, it is God-loved — a love made clear in God's own selfless act of giving.

Christian stewardship simply, yet profoundly, imitates God's example of giving. Stewardship is our love taking form, as God's love took form, through the giving of ourselves. Stewardship is nothing more and nothing less. Taken together, these two verses provide stewardship's most enduring starting point — stewardship as an act of selfless thanksgiving.

Bishop Eaton Issues Statement on Anti-Transgender Legislation

As we approach March 31, many people are preparing to recognize Transgender Day of Visibility, an international day to celebrate the contributions of transgender people and raise awareness about the deadly injustices they face.

As bishop of this church, I am concerned that the rights of transgender and nonbinary Americans have been targeted all over this nation. Nearly 400 anti-LGBTQIA+ bills were introduced across the United States in 2022, most of them targeting trans youth. That is twice the number from 2021 and almost eight times the total from 2020. The language in many of these bills attacks the humanity of trans and nonbinary people, often erasing the dignity that should be afforded to everyone.

While members of our church hold various convictions regarding gender, the teaching of our church supports legislation and policies to protect every person's human dignity and civil rights. (Human Sexuality, p. 19) As Christians we believe every human being is created in God's image, and we must honor and celebrate God's creation. Our church teaches that we affirm transgender and nonbinary siblings as God's children, who are loved unconditionally. Our social statement *Faith, Sexism, and Justice: A Call to Action* (2019) also declares that this church commits itself to "advocate for and support laws, policies, and practices that respect diverse bodies rather than discriminating against, objectifying, or devaluing them" (p. 60).

I urge us, as people of faith, to love our neighbors, care for the vulnerable and marginalized, and work for justice and equality. We may have differing opinions on "matters related to sexual orientation and gender identity," (FSJ, p. 61) but we must always uphold the dignity and humanity of everyone. These disagreements do not allow us to accept actions that dehumanize, discriminate against or objectify any individual or group.

We must stand together, dear church, faithfully advocating for the full humanity and dignity of all people. Let us recognize and affirm the humanity of our transgender and nonbinary siblings. Let us advocate for their dignity. Let us continue to be guided by God's love and compassion as we seek justice and equality for everyone.






