Laurel A. Dykstra wrote the following under the title "Slapstick Comedy."

"Justo González, Cuban-born theologian and promoter of Latino theological education, claims that humor is one way the author of Luke-Acts engages in "moderate subversion" of an early church that was becoming increasingly exclusive in its models of leadership. Jesus' ascension, as it is described in the first chapter of Acts, is one of the funnier biblical narratives—practically slapstick.

"In a final, over-the-top demonstration of "not getting it," an unspecified group of apostles demand of the resurrected Jesus, "Lord, is this the time when you will restore the kingdom to Israel?" (Acts 1:6). My crude paraphrase is: "Great, you're not dead. *Now* are we going to kick some Roman butt and take our rightful place as kings?"

"In response, Jesus promises an entirely different kind of power and then promptly disappears into a cloud, as though in exasperation. I imagine later there was a fair amount of forehead-slapping among his followers, with them saying, "I can't believe that was the last thing we said to him."

"So, the stooges are standing gawking up at the place where Jesus has disappeared when two men appear and ask why. The scene is parallel to Luke 24, where two men in dazzling clothes chasten the women at the empty tomb for seeking Jesus in the wrong place. The men's appearance is sudden but not necessarily supernatural—they may simply have walked up on the distracted cloud-gazers. "Why do you stand looking up toward heaven?" they said (Acts 1:11). I expect the unrecorded response from the disciples was, "Agh! Where did you come from?"

"Many of us are looking for Jesus in the wrong places; our faith lives consist too much of standing and looking up. We could use a poke in the eye, a ride on a banana peel, or a pie in the face to get us to look at the world around us and those who are standing next to us." I can't help but wonder if we, as the people of God in this place, aren't standing around wondering if God is going to do something about . . . Who do we need to appear to us and ask, "Why are you standing around looking awkwardly?" Can we begin to see and bear witness to the amazing grace of God in Christ? Can we recognize and champion the work being done through our ELCA World Hunger Appeal, our Lutheran World Relief efforts, our Lutheran Disaster response right here in Nebraska? Hopefully, we can see and say yes with support and encouragement.

Do you remember the last hand-written note you received? Writing notes used to be standard practice, but today we turn to email, text, and social media to thank and communicate with others. We email newsletters chock-full of information, send reminders via text (often with acronyms and poor grammar), and point people to websites with calendars and electronic forms. More and more we are sharing lessons and news through video, audio, and photos online to communicate with one another and promote our mission. We have more communication channels than ever before, but is something lost in all the options? In my experience, people engage with church where they feel like they have a real and authentic connection. Certainly, we are in the business of building relationships with Jesus Christ, but one of the ways we do that is through authentic relationships with fellow church members. We have fellowship gatherings, and encourage prayer, for instance, to help build those bonds, but how do we build or maintain those relationships through our communications? Hand-written notes!

Cut through the technological clutter with a simple, yet meaningful handwritten note that tells the other person you care enough about them to slow down long enough to share your appreciation. This simple act of giving thanks via a hand-written note will endear the recipient to you and will strengthen your relationship. A member of Grace sends notes to many persons for birthdays, anniversaries and events. A wonderful delight is experienced in receiving such a note.

Have you tried such an activity? Not sure what to write? Thank them for something you have noticed about them (their voice, their smile). If you can't come up with something specific, then thank them for being part of the church. The notes do not need to be long, but push yourself to be as specific and genuine as possible.

May the joy and wonder of sharing notes bring delight to all.



What is Juneteenth?

Juneteenth

Juneteenth celebrates the ending of slavery in the **Junetee** United States. President Lincoln signed the

Emancipation Proclamation on June 1, 1863. Although the Emancipation Proclamation was signed on June 1st, Juneteenth is celebrated on June 19th because it was on that very day Texas, the last state agreed to end slavery.

History of Slavery in Nebraska

Nebraska became a territory in 1854, and during that year, the "Kansas-Nebraska Act allowed the Nebraska Territorial Legislature to decide whether slavery should be legal in the Territory." The Nebraskan Legislature decided to legalize slavery until 1862 when they then reconsidered and placed a ban on slavery, one year before the President signed the Emancipation Proclamation in 1863.

Nebraska was admitted as a state to the Union in 1867 after they discarded a clause set in the State Constitution that limited suffrage to only "free white males." Then in 1875, Nebraska included a formal ban on their State Constitution, which banned "slavery and involuntary servitude, except as a punishment for a crime." Here is the direct passage from the Nebraska State Constitution:

"There shall be neither slavery nor involuntary servitude in this state, otherwise than for punishment of crime, whereof the party shall have been duly convicted."


