We have now held our annual meetings and set the mission plans. One of the things that we have not put in our plans is the opportunity to intentionally

advocate on behalf of others. Each year our State Senators submit bills to be considered by the Legislature. Some are helpful and some are not.

We have two wonderful non-profit organizations, Voices for Children (voicesforchildren.com) and Nebraska Appleseed (neappleseed.org), who review the legislative bills and make recommendations for action.

So, for example, Voices for Children sent the following: This next week we encourage you to comment or testify in support of LB 952, which would allow qualified children across Nebraska increased food access during the summer months. The bill would require our state Department of Health and Human Services to enter the federal program. An estimated 150,000 or more Nebraska children qualify for the summer-EBT, which gives families with children an extra \$120 to purchase food during the months school is not in session.

The bill was introduced by Senator Day and cosponsored by a bipartisan group of senators. Senator Aguilar identified it this week as his legislative priority bill, which means if voted out of committee it will get a debate on the floor. Thank you to Senator Day, Senator Aguilar, and all the senators supporting this legislation to fight child hunger during the summer!

A second example is: Keep your eyes on floor debate on Senator Walz's <u>LB 285</u>, a carryover bill from last year that would maximize school uptake of the federal Community Eligibility Provision which allows schools to feed all students free lunch without administrative barriers, if the school is located in a low-income zipcode. The bill has been placed on the legislative agenda and could be debated early next week. We will be there in the lobby to support it, ensuring all students are nourished and ready to learn!

I would encourage you to consider connecting with your State Senator and express your thoughts on each of these bills. If you don't know your Senator's email or phone number you can find that information at https://www.nebraskalegislature.gov/

It is important for us to advocate on behalf of those who cannot speak for themselves. Our efforts to provide for our children is in keeping with Jesus' admonition to the disciples to "let the children come to me." I hope you will consider advocating on behalf of Nebraska's children.

## Souper Bowl of Caring

In 1990, a simple prayer: "Lord, even as we enjoy the Super Bowl football game, help us be mindful of those who are without a bowl of soup to eat" was delivered to a small youth group at Spring Valley Presbyterian Church in Columbia, SC led by Brad Smith, who was serving as a seminary intern at the time.

This gave birth to an idea. Why not harness the energy and enthusiasm of Super Bowl weekend, a time when people come together for football, food and fun, to unite the nation for a higher good? Individuals and groups could collect dollars in soup pots and canned food for those in need and send every dollar and food donation DIRECTLY to a local charity of THEIR choice.

That was 1990. Since then, Tackle Hunger, with its signature Souper Bowl of Caring event has become a national, grass-roots, youthinspired movement where ordinary people are doing extraordinary good. Over \$193 MILLION in dollars and food has been generated while benefiting thousands of soup kitchens, food banks, meal programs and other hunger-relief charities in local communities.

Sunday, February 11th, we will be collecting food items in support of the "Tackle Hunger - Souper Bowl of Caring". All food items will be donated to the Loaves and Fishes Pantry and their ongoing services to those in need in the neighborhood and surrounding community.

# **BIBLE STUDY** This meditation, the last of a short series

focused on the psalms, looks at Psalm 138, a hymn of thanksgiving and praise for God's goodness. (OK, Psalms 148 and 150 may outstrip for being 100% praise, but this one is right up there with the best!)

As I sit here ready to write, I know that we are all surrounded by mounds of snow, and we feel the bitter cold. The excitement leading up to Christmas has passed. Many folks bear the weight of mid-January gray-sky "blahs", bills are coming due, and some families face hunger by the end of the month. Personally, I notice the headache and sore throat of "maybe coming down with something", as well as sore muscles from shoveling the driveway. Two more inches of snow anticipated soon, and a low tire pressure alert lit up today on my dashboard! Is this any time to sing thanks and praise to God?

Well, sure it is! We don't need to <u>feel</u> grateful and awestruck to praise God. We include praise in our worship service every Sunday, don't we? And it's right that we do, because God is so good, and so good **to** us, every day. I am reminded of that by the words "steadfast love" in verse three of the psalm. In the RSV and NRSV, whenever we read that phrase, we know that the Hebrew words "Hesed Emeth" lie beneath it. They speak of God's tender, truthful, righteous, just, and enduring care for us, based on a covenant going all the way back to Sinai, after God freed the Israelites from Egypt. For us Christians, welcomed into the Beloved Community by Baptism, that Covenant was made totally new, and sealed, by the blood of Jesus on the Cross.

I can still remember, forty-plus years later, the way that teacher Brigid Meierotto enthused for over thirty minutes in class about the meaning of Hesed Emeth. I don't remember all the words, of course, but felt images... I remember the yearning parental tenderness of God, expressed in Jeremiah 31:20, and in Hosea 14:6-7. I remember the determination, hope, and strength expressed in Isaiah 44:2-8.

And <u>that's</u> why we can pray this psalm with confidence, regardless of our current circumstances. In fact, we can even go on with the apostle Paul, to sing: "Glory be to him whose power, working in us, can do infinitely more than we can ask or imagine; glory be to him from generation to generation in the Church and in Christ Jesus for ever and ever. Amen." Whoo!

Easy Homemade Granola

1/2 cup neutral oil, such as sunflower, 1/2 cup honey or maple syrup1/2 teaspon ground cinnamon, 1/2 teaspoon salt3 cups old-fashioned rolled oats, 1 cup sliced almonds1 cup raisins or other dried, chapped fruit

Preheat oven to 300 degrees F. Line a rimmed baking sheet with parchment paper. Wisk together the oil, honey, cinnamon, and salt in a large bowl. Add the oats and almonds to the oil mixture and stir well to coat. Spread mixture out onto the prepared baking sheet into an even layer. Use spatula to press out clumps. Bake for 20 minuts when granola is golden-brown. Stir halfway through baking time. Mixture will feel wet when done but will dry as it cools. Remove from oven, placing pan on wire rack and sprinkle raisins or other fruit over the granola. Cool completely then store in an airtight container.
