You have likely noticed in the notes from the Council meetings that your Council Members and I have been reading a book titled "Leading Faithful Innovation." The authors are professors at Luther Seminary in

Minnesota.

They begin by asking the following question. What might God be up to amid the seismic changes the church and our culture are undergoing? What opportunities will congregations encounter if they rediscover and follow God's leading?

As they develop their thoughts from numerous meetings in which they sought to get insight from congregational leaders, they come to say, "the steps in the faithful innovation process are simple: Listen, Act, and Share.

So far, we have read the chapter on Listen and the chapter on Act. The journey of Listen-Act-Share addresses a question that congregations everywhere are asking: We know our church needs to change, but we're not sure what to do.

In the chapter on Listening, they write: Listening involves learning to walk (or bike or drive) around your neighborhood while asking God to help you see what God sees in that place. With listening, the conversation shifts from talking about institutional survival to learning how to join in the work God is doing in the world.

I can't help but wonder about those that came together to create our worshiping communities. I imagine that they walked about their community and observed what they perceived as God's interest and direction for their community. I doubt they spent any time worrying about whether they would be able to survive as an institution.

In the next chapter on Act, they state: The church as an institution needs to undergo a transformation so that it can learn to forge fresh connections with people inside its walls and outside in the community. They indicate that acting simply means we are going to try some new things that we hope will help us learn how to follow God's leading and be

the church. They suggest that we need to take steps to try something new. They define an experiment as a planned set of actions that help us behave our way into new thinking so that we can learn how to address the challenges we are facing. Ultimately, we wish to be transformed personally as followers of Jesus.

All of this, so far, suggests that we need to be active in prayer, develop better listening skills and be willing to take some risks. I find this to be a delightful and challenging journey. I am hopeful that we can follow God into a hopeful future.

Minutes of May 9, 2024, meeting: Minutes were accepted by motion. Book Study: Chapter 3 "Act" of the Leading, faithful, Innovation was discussed. Please read Chapter 4 "Share" for next month.

#### **Unfinished Business:**

- 1. Roof Status Steve Braun gave an update. The new project manager, Joey Swafford from McKinnis Roofing, stated that they hope to start on our roof soon.
- 2. Conversations with Grace continue. A Grace/St. Luke's Ministry Discernment Team will be assembled with up to six members from each congregation.
- 3. Synod Assembly John Kolb gave an update. The theme of the synod was "Cultivate Love."

<u>Call to Order</u> Sarah Emery called the meeting to order at 7:04 p.m.

Gathering of Prayers Prayer concerns were offered for individuals as they heal and/or work toward peace in their lives. Cease fire in Middle East and Ukraine and other hot spots around the world. Protection for travelers into and through summer months. Strength for all who are dealing with weather related struggles. Violence and guns – help us to find ways to lay down weapons for the good of all.

#### Built On a Rock ∼ by LaRayne Topp

Angry tornados, a lone place of worship, and the whispers of a gracious God left an ELCA Church in Pilger, Nebraska, as a place of sanctuary in a world turned upside down and sideways. Ten years ago, on June 16, 2014, four destructive tornadoes charged through Northeast Nebraska, eliminating farm buildings from the landscape around Pilger, Stanton, Wakefield and Wisner, along with 40 percent of the homes from the heart of Pilger. The storms also stole two lives.

Homes lay in rubble. Trees were twisted toothpicks. Grain bins served as giant, sharp projectiles, slamming into buildings and searing off roofs. In Pilger, the business district was wiped out, leaving only several usable public buildings, one of them St. Peter's Lutheran Church. It was amazing the church had survived at all, only a half a block from the destruction.

Although the building stood, glass shards from the glass doors and windows, branches and debris littered the interior. However, the communion rail, separating the chancel from the rest of the sanctuary, also divided kept destruction at bay. The cross and candelabra rested on the altar; the pages of the open Bible hadn't been mussed. Paraments hung from the pulpit and lectern, the bottom fringe remaining untangled. All was still.

Until one woman heard a gentle whisper. Several weeks after the tornadoes hit, Val Petersen was awakened one night to the sound of God's gentle voice. "Open a coffee shop," it said. And so she and her husband did. Not wanting to tie the coffee shop to a particular denomination, the Petersens named it The Rock Shop.

Previous St. Peter's Pastors Ruth and Gary Larson had donated a mammoth granite rock to the congregation before they left for the mission field, chiseled with the words, You are the Christ.

Symbolic of shelter and safety, the rock served as a reminder of Christ's words to Apostle Peter: And on this rock I will build my church, and the gates of Hades will not overcome it. Indeed the tornado hadn't budged the massive stone one inch.

Relief organizations' meetings were held at the Rock Shop, at the village, county, state and federal level. It was also open for survivors and volunteers to meet. Conversations gradually became happier than at first. As businesses built back up in town, The Rock Shop was discontinued to turn its business over to them.

After ten years, 20 new homes have sprung up in town. More than 200 trees have been replanted, and numerous businesses and civil buildings rebuilt.

In January of 2022, St. Peter's congregation held its last service. However, the building has been gifted to the local Historical Society with the understanding the sanctuary remain intact. To date five funerals, one wedding and a quilt show have taken place at The Rock Museum and Chapel, with historical items on display throughout the rest of the building.

St. Peter's Lutheran Church has served the community since 1900, providing a lifeline for the community in a time of deep distress, and will continue to showcase its history along with that of the area for many years to come.

Through this fund, we are able to help respond to needs related to recovery and rebuilding for the long-haul. BIBLE STUDY Sometimes while praying, I read a verse or two of the Gospel, and it scares me silly! (see Mt. 5:20,22; 7:1, 13-14; Mk 11:23b, and Luke

6:24-26.) I know full well that my living doesn't meet any Gospel standard. I'm a liar and a thief and...(I stole a quarter from my brother once, but I couldn't stand the guilt. Then my brother caught me when I was putting it back. Unfair!) Even now, leave a cookie undefended on a table, and I'll scarf it up as I walk by. I've done worse things, too, but I won't tell you about those. All of which causes me to puzzle when people yell that they want justice for a personal wrong. When my time comes to be judged, I won't want justice; I'll want great gobs of mercy! (To those who may object that I often call for justice, ves. I care about historical justice, justice between peoples. You've heard me talk about Palestinians. Then there's the Rohinga of Burma/Myanmar, Armenians, Kurds, Namibians, and the people of Western Sahara, often called Polisarios. Others, too, but I can't spell their names.)

In the reading we look at today, St. Paul writes about deep issues of salvation justice between peoples, and between God and us. Please try something. First, read Romans 9:19-24. Then go back and start at verse 14. Read forward to verse 29. You can continue on to verse 33, or even take it to chapter 10, verse 4. Do the different stops make a difference in how you see things? I'm no Scripture scholar, so I can't really explain it to you. But I can encourage all of you to spend a little time with verse 16 of chapter 9. In the end, when I feel a bit depressed by an informal life review, I look to Jesus, and to the wonderful, abundant mercy of God!




