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I receive a devotional each day from the Center for Action and Contemplation. I am choosing to share one of those devotionals that touches a real cord in me. The devotional was titled:

Protecting Our Own Light.

Brian McLaren considers how authoritarian systems seek conformity. He highlights practices of contemplation and community that can strengthen our resolve and enable us to remain "salt and light" under difficult circumstances.

An expert in authoritarian regimes, Sarah Kendzior captures the danger like this: Authoritarianism is not merely a matter of state control, it is something that eats away at who you are. It makes you afraid, and fear can make you cruel. It compels you to conform and to comply and accept things that you would never accept, to do things you never thought you would do.

No wonder, in a time of authoritarian Ceasar-worship, the early Christian leader Paul wrote, "Do not be conformed to this world. But be transformed by the renewal of your minds." (Romans 12:2). Kendzior addresses this very need for inner renewal and transformation. Authoritarian regimes, she says, ...can take everything from you in material terms – your house, your job, your ability to speak and move freely. They cannot take away who you truly are. They can never truly know you, and this is your power. But to protect and wield this power, you need to know yourself – right now, before their methods permeate, before you accept the obscene and unthinkable as normal.

Although she doesn't use the word contemplation, Kendzior points to the importance of knowing who we are, centering into what Howard Thurman called "the sound of the genuine" inside us. She continues, ...We are heading into dark times, and you need to be your own light. Do not accept brutality and cruelty as normal even if it is sanctioned. Protect the vulnerable and encourage the afraid. If you are brave, stand up for others. If you cannot be brave – and it is often hard to be brave – be kind. But most of all, never lose sight of who you are and what you value.

I am thinking about these authoritarian patterns not only to better understand what's happening now in my country. I'm also trying to understand my own country's history – how millions of so-called Christians in the {United States} consented to the genocide of Indigenous peoples and then consented to the enslavement of kidnapped and trafficked Africans and then consented to the American apartheid in the Jim Crow era and then resisted the civil rights movement.

Studying biases and authoritarianism is also helping me understand in a deeper way why contemplative practices, and especially contemplative practices in community are so important right now.

Contemplative practices are many things. Our Christian tradition teaches us that they are pathways into the direct experience of divine presence and love. Contemporary neuroscience adds that they are also pathways into self-regulation...Contemplative practices – both solitary and communal – help us resist conformity with wisdom and courage.

May we know ourselves, resist conformity with wisdom and courage.

Stewardship

Yesterday, today and tomorrow: 80 years of your compassion

"NO MATTER HOW FAR..." Floods, earthquakes, war and other emergencies affect everyone, but it's the world's poorest who suffer most. That's why Lutheran World Relief is there to offer help and hope, wherever and whenever disaster strikes. Clean water. Nourishing food. Safe shelter. Emergency supplies. Time and again, you act quickly to rush aid where it's needed most.

This incredible outpouring of support for neighbors in crisis began in 1945 and has continued with each new generation of Lutherans.

YESTERDAY: For more than 80 years, your compassion has been there, reaching the most vulnerable in their darkest moments.

TODAY: Through a waste management program, farmer Rehmulibr Sembiring and her husband Adit Sinulingga learned to produce organic fertilizers. Besides being better for their lands, it's also less expensive, meaning the savings can go towards the children's education.

TOMORROW: You're changing that for girls like Salamatu Conteh, who at only 13, is at risk of dropping out of school. Your compassion is providing opportunities with cash grants and innovative technology to keep girls in school. By addressing both financial and non-financial barriers, you are helping our neighbors beat the odds to stay on a path to a brighter future.

IN THE LONG TERM: Emergency relief is essential in a crisis, but you don't stop there.

The world's poorest families need lasting solutions, not just relief. The world's poorest families need more than relief, they need lasting change. By supporting farmers, creating job opportunities for youth and improving health and education, we can help break the cycle of poverty together.

Sustainable development takes time, but love is patient. And although this work rarely makes the news, your impact truly transforms lives for generations.

BIBLE STUDY This month, we look at the prophet Zechariah, called to prophesy only a couple of months after the prophet Haggai. Seventy

years of exile in Babylon had passed, and the first returnees had arrived in Jerusalem to rebuild the Temple. Haggai and Zechariah were post-exile prophets in Israel. Ezekiel, who prophesied the siege of Jerusalem, had also received very detailed instructions for rebuilding the Temple. (See Ezekiel, chapters forty and following.) All three shared some common concerns from God, with each other, with Ezra and, later, Nehemiah.

The book of Zechariah is clearly divided into Part I, chapters 1-8, and Part II, chapters 9-14. The second part shows a mix of themes, including the failure of the shepherds of Israel, similar to Ezekiel's chapter 34, which, though, is more detailed. Part II also contains an oracle against a foreign nation, and an endtimes battle for Jerusalem - quite confusing! Since it could not have been written before Alexander the Great conquered the Persian Empire, we will lay it aside and focus mostly on Part I. However, Part II does hold a messianic hope, voiced in these words which we heard just recently during worship:

"Rejoice greatly, O daughter of Zion! Shout aloud, O daughter of Jerusalem! Lo, your king comes to you. Triumphant and victorious is he, humble and riding on an ass. on a colt, the foal of an ass." Zech. 9:9 (RSV)

In Part I of Zechariah, the world has changed. There are no more kings of Israel and Judah. Assyria has risen and fallen, as has Babylon. Now the Persians lead the world, and King Darius has appointed Zerubbabel to guide the rebuilding of the Temple in Palestine. That's in the world of political power. Postexilic Israel is a world in which religious leaders are coming into their own, so Joshua, the High Priest, is also very important. The middle eastern world is becoming more and more like the one into which Jesus, the Messiah, will be born.

Zechariah points to a new age of union with the Lord, an age of hope and wholeness.

" Thus says the Lord: I will return to Zion and will dwell in the midst of Ierusalem. Jerusalem will be called the faithful city, and the mountain of the Lord of Hosts. the Holy Mountain." Zech. 8:3 (RSV)
