PASTOR!

I wish to continue sharing a few thoughts from the book that your transition team and I are reading.

Leonard Sweet writes in the section Via: the Way. "People often called Jesus a rabbi. But in his ministry, we discover major contrasts to the rabbinical method. Jesus was a new breed of rabbi. Three distinct differences stand out in the way Jesus went about his role as rabbi.

First, he did the inviting. The other rabbis typically waited for young men to approach them, asking permission to sit under the rabbi's teaching. . . . But Jesus went out looking for followers and issued the summons himself.

Second, women were prominently featured in the troupe of his followers. This was one of the many ways Jesus went against the religious grain and norms of his day.

Third, Jesus didn't invite his followers to merely learn his teachings. He wanted them to learn him.

Jesus is summoning you: "Come, follow me. Come, be with me, and I will do more than teach you the way to live your one and only life. I will give you life. In fact, this hanging together will not be for a limited time. We will do life together from now on.

It is significant that the Greek words for "come after" and "follow" are different. "Come after" means to line up behind or line up after in lockstep fashion. In contrast, "follow" means to "walk alongside" or "journey beside."

The first followers of Jesus were known as those who belonged to "the Way." What a curious moniker for the newly formed band of disciples. They had a way about them. . . These people had a way about how they went about their lives, a way of being that had not been witnessed before.

I wonder if this is part of our Christian confusion today. Is there anything different about us as followers of Jesus? Do we have a way of being that hasn't been seen before? If not, maybe this is why our numbers continue to decline across the Christian traditions.

What might our way of being different look like? Would there be certain actions that are unusual in this culture? How might we begin to look like followers of "the Way"?

Thoughts? I'd love to hear them.

As we get ready to celebrate Independence Day, many of us plan to attend fireworks displays, a backyard picnic, or perhaps enjoy fun at the beach. The American Red Cross offers these tips so you can enjoy a fun-packed, safe holiday.

FIREWORKS SAFETY

The safest way to enjoy fireworks is to attend a public firework show put on by professionals. Stay at least 500 feet away from the show. Many states outlaw most fireworks. Leave any area immediately where untrained amateurs are using fireworks, If you are setting fireworks off at home, follow these safety steps:

Never give fireworks to small children, and never throw or point a firework toward people, animals, vehicles, structures or flammable materials. Always follow the instructions on the packaging.

Keep a supply of water close by as a precaution.

Make sure the person lighting fireworks always wears eye protection.

Light only one firework at a time and never attempt to relight a "dud."

Store fireworks in a cool, dry place away from childen and pets.

BIBLE STUDY This month we say goodbye to the prophets for a while, and we turn to other things - like the cross. This is NOT one of my favorite

topics to discuss. I dislike pain, loss, disappointment, and suffering of any kind - all that negative stuff. I prefer to run away from it. I haven't seen a dentist in a couple of years, 'cuz I'm scared of pain. I am not a saint or a hero. I believe that Jesus died on a cross to free all of us from sin, and to bring us back to the Holy One. Thank-you, Jesus! I will be grateful always, always, and I am willing to live for you the best that I can. I have a problem, tho', with this: "Then to all [Jesus] said, "If anyone wants to be a follower of mine, let him renounce himself and take up his cross everyday and follow me." Luke 9:23 That's mighty hard to get around. I do want to know Iesus: I do! And I've suffered: breast cancer, dislocated knee, Covid (twice), arthritis, injustices, romantic break-ups, rejections, why, I've given birth four times, for Pete's sake! But all that is not a cross, a preacher once told us - that's the human condition that we all share. The Cross, he told us. is suffering borne for the sake of the Gospel.

"Mr. Perfect", also known as Saul of Tarsus, later Paul, had a few things to say about the cross. In 1 Cor. 10:13, he talked about our sufferings and how God gives us strength to bear them. In Gal. 2:19 " I have been crucified with Christ, and I live now not with my own life, but with the life of Christ who lives in me." And then there's Gal. 6:14 "...the only thing I can boast about is the Cross of Our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom the world is crucified to me, and I to the world." This is heady, mystical stuff - and somehow it gets distilled down to our children in Sunday School singing:

"The one way to peace is the Rock of the Cross -His banner over me is Love."

Meanwhile, about five million Americans last month participated in a "No Kings in America" protest, families in Gaza continued to starve, and ICE forces hunted down the immigrants among us (to deport them) - God, have mercy on us all!

This feels unsatisfying as an ending, certainly a tension unresolved. And unresolved tension is, all too often, part of living the faith in the real world. Maybe the best that I can do at the moment is point towards St. Paul's wonderful prayer in Ephesians 3:14-21. Maybe that's what a person comes to if they can pick up their cross and follow Jesus.
