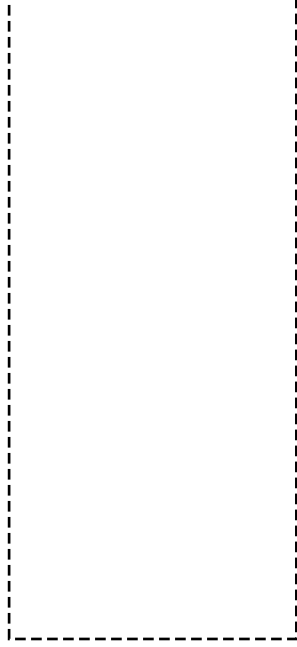

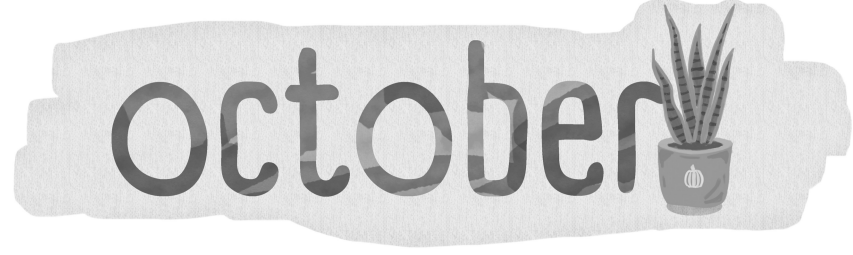

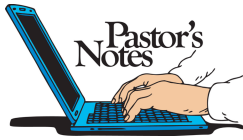

The Fall months are now beginning. Early on my ministry, I was approached by a colleague who had the responsibility of engaging faith communities in the effort to provide funding for persons experiencing hunger. I recall working with him to start a fund-raising effort here in Omaha with a CROP Walk. Unfortunately, this volunteer effort stopped its work here about ten years ago.

The concern for persons experiencing hunger has not abated, though. Our weekly pantry at Grace serves people each week with food donated from Trader Joes and Whole Foods. This effort is important when each week we give away all that we receive. Many of those who receive this food express their thanks each week.

In listening to other providers, the word is much the same. There are more people coming for food assistance now. A couple weeks ago, I received a statistical report from the Coalition on Human Needs. In that report, the percent of people reporting their households sometimes or often did not have enough to eat in the past 7 days increased from 8 percent in 2021 to 12 percent in 2024. This is heartbreaking news in the richest country in the world.

The citizens advocacy group, Bread for the World, continues to be at the forefront of the movement to end hunger, uniting communities and championing advocacy that delivers lasting change for people experiencing hunger, both in the United States and around the world.

As you heard during this summer, Congress passed a budget bill that will increase hunger in the United States and will harm children, families and vulnerable adults in our communities.

The meeting opened at 5:34 p.m. with a gathering of prayers for individuals and communities. For the victims of the recent school shooting. Some personal requests, ongoing struggles in the world and folks dealing with fear and uncertainty.

Devotions were shared from the Daily Texts.

From the "I Am A Follower" book – discussions were shared around two questions: What is the business that we are to be in? How are you doing in sharing that business? **Please continue to reflect.** Read pages 126-134 for next month.

Financial Secretary and Treasurer reports were received and accepted.

Shared future considerations:

Transition team discussed many ideas on the best way for our congregation to share the business we are called to be. This led to a conversation about connection for God's Work, Our Hands. It was felt the strongest connection may be in forming a partnership with Nebraska Nursing Home.

Reports:

- The AC unit at St. Luke's has been repaired.
- Workforce Solutions willing to share so that we can eliminate dumpster.
- The roof at Grace has a leak and will need repaired.
- Electrical work needed at Grace to repair the building exhaust fan.

Grow –

1. A Bible Study in the book of Acts will be scheduled every Monday in October at 5:30pm. This will be at St. Luke's.
2. Confirmation classes will begin on September 10th.
3. Fall Stewardship Emphasis will be "We Say Yes."

Love –

1. Pantry needs an additional driver to deliver donations from Trader Joe's to Grace on Sunday mornings.
2. God's Work, Our Hands – we plan to deliver cookies and interact with residents at Nebraska Nursing Home.
3. Thank you notes were shared from Crossroads and Grace Lutheran Church in New Orleans.
4. A Google Review was shared, from an individual grateful the space was available outside of church services.

Serve –

1. Thrivent Fall Effort – Fall Food Shelf Challenge – 500 food items need to be collected, then Thrivent will give \$500 to the pantry.
2. Ideas were discussed for a grant through Immanuel Vision Foundation.
3. The first reading of the school year has taken place at Liberty and Spring Lake.
4. Mission Field Nebraska is hosting a fundraiser for multiple organizations, including San Andrés, on September 28th 2:00 – 4:00 pm at Glacial Till Cider House & Tasting Room, Ashland, NE.
5. Personal Care Kits will be assembled November 2nd following worship service. All are invited to help with the assembly.
6. Information was shared regarding Omaha City Ordinance 44395. Local elected officials are considering a new ordinance which would allow law enforcement to ticket, fine, and arrest people experiencing homelessness in Omaha. If you feel this measure is unnecessary, expensive, counterproductive and cruel, please call your council member or the mayor's hotline.

We Say Yes!

Our theme will be “We Say Yes!”

In 1 Corinthians 4:1-2 we read these words: Think of us in this way, as servants of Christ and stewards of God’s mysteries. Moreover, it is required of stewards that they be found trustworthy.

Saying “Yes” to God is risky. A sensible person simply wouldn’t do it. Think about it. The prayer that many of us hear in church on Pentecost goes like this: “God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, as you sent upon the disciples the promised gift of the Holy Spirit, look upon your Church and open our hearts to the power of the Spirit. Kindle in us the fire of your love, and strengthen our lives for service in your kingdom . . .”

That’s a very nice prayer. Who can argue with “open our hearts” and “strengthen our lives”? The prayer asks very large things in very comfortable phrases. Certainly, this prayer lets us sound like we are saying “Yes” to God—but without taking any unnecessary chances.

But what if our Pentecost prayer went more like this: Lord, grab me out of my safe life and compel me to heal and teach and reveal your love so powerfully that I am scorned by the complacent, feared by the unjust, and hated by the evil one.

We probably would not want to pray like that.

The earliest stories in Scripture establish human accountability. The story of the fall turns on God’s questions to God’s erring creatures: “Where are you?” and “What have you done?” Adam and Eve broke the limits of freedom that God had established, and they were called to account. Similarly, the story of Cain and Abel establishes another accountability for humankind. The center of the story is God’s question to Cain, “Where is your brother?” And Cain’s response, “Am I my brother’s keeper?” is answered with a resounding, “Yes,” as Cain is held to account for his action against his brother. Fundamental to being human beings created in the image of God, is that we are accountable to God. God continues to call out the questions: “Where are you? What have you done? Where is your brother?”

Though it may seem that Scripture is full of judgments, it is filled even more with the story of God’s love, God’s choosing, and God’s gifts and promises. Indeed, promises abound.

If a promise is a “Yes,” then God can be called a “Yes”-saying God, because the God of Scripture is indeed a promising God. The Bible continually tells of God’s promises, God’s intention to keep God’s promises, and God’s fulfillment of those promises.

Promises are fundamental to God’s action toward and on behalf of people (Psalm 126:2). In Scripture, a promise is never casual; it is always relational, always forward looking (1 Corinthians 1:20), and always of benefit to the recipient of the promise (Psalm 18:30). In addition, because the promises of God are dependable (Joshua 23:14; 2 Samuel 22:2-3; 1 Kings 8:20; 1 Peter 2:9; Hebrews 10:23), they form the basis of hope (Jeremiah 29:10-11).

We can count on God’s promises and act on those promises knowing that what we do, what we share and what we donate are part of the relationship with Christ and our community.

Let us Say Yes to our support of the ministry we share in Christ.

This month, we look at two places in St. Paul's first letter to the church at Corinth.

BIBLE STUDY

These passages are 1Cor. 1:4-9 and a single verse, 1Cor. 16:13. Together, they urge believers to be steadfast in the faith, brave, and strong. As always, the message is for us, as well. There isn't anything new or different here. Paul encourages early Christians to be faithful, strong, and pure in many places. For instance, see Romans 14:22, 2Cor. 6:2ff, Philippians 1:10, and 1Timothy 6:12. I think of them as Paul's "hang on, baby!" verses.

Only one problem pops up: I am not brave, steadfast, or strong! Are you? I certainly don't feel any of that in me! So, where is it to come from? The word "steadfast" always reminds me of God's steadfast love. In the RSV, any time you read the words "steadfast love", you can know that below those words is the Hebrew "hesed emeth", a phrase rich in meaning. It encompasses both the gentle tenderness of God's love for each of us, and the justice, righteousness, and majesty of God's covenantal fidelity.

And that reminds me of the Arabic "sumud", which could also be translated as "steadfastness." Sumud is what Palestinians have demonstrated for over seventy-five years as they hang on, endure, persist, and go on living, under immense persecution, suffering, and in mortal danger from the powers of this world, concretized in the resolute hate of Israel and its leaders, both in Gaza and the West Bank. The conditions of

their existence are so harsh and demeaning that it is an act of resistance to evil simply to go on living, and not to leave their homeland. They desperately need our prayer, our spoken support for their right to live in peace and with dignity in their own land, and our donations to feed the children of Gaza. I am often amazed and awed when I hear Palestinian speakers relate tales of their lives in Palestine, and of the faith, both Christian and Muslim, which is bedrock for their struggle.

Let us look more closely at 1Cor. 1: 4-9 for answers to 'where is it to come from?' Verse four begins, " I never stop thanking God..." Of course! It all begins with God, through Jesus. Verse five speaks of our witness to God, which we are all called to do. Verses six to eight point to what we are waiting for, and when. How do you read that? And they promise that ..."he will keep you steady and without blame". Good, because, if it all depends on me, I'm sunk! If it all depends on God, then I can hope - because, verse nine tells us, God has joined us to Christ, and God is faithful.

Only because it all depends on God can we say 'yes' when Paul writes: "Be awake to all the dangers; stay firm in the faith; be brave and be strong. Let everything you do be done in love." 1Cor. 16:13 Maybe, during these days of political violence and vicious name-calling, one of the most important things we can do is speak respectfully of others. We need to speak the truth as we see it; and we can disagree forcefully, but we do not need to cut people down by slurring their race, religion, color, party, accent, mother's heritage, abysmal lack of fashion sense, yada, yada, yada...

The Transition Team, in the mission effort of Grow, decided to offer an in-person Bible Study on Mondays in October. The meeting will take place at St. Luke's, starting at 5:30 pm. It will last one hour.



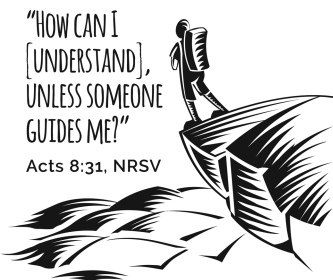
The Bible Study will feature the Graphic Novel of Acts as created by Rev. Dr. Steve Thomason, Associate Professor of Spiritual Formation at Luther Seminary.

The Acts of the Apostles (aka Acts) is part 2 of Luke's gospel. Luke tells the story of Jesus in volume one (Gospel of Luke), and in volume two (Acts) he tells the story of how Jesus' disciples take his message to the world.

Luke was not an apostle or an eyewitness to the life of Jesus, however, he is one of the best people to have written these stories. He was part of the apostle Paul's traveling party during the last part of Paul's story in Acts (the narration switches to first person in Acts 16:10).

Paul was in prison for two years in Caesarea (see Acts 21-26). It is likely that Luke spent those two years investigating the life of Jesus and the early days of the church in Jerusalem. These eye-witness interviews with people like Mary, Peter, John, the Sanhedrin, etc. gave Luke the material he needed to write his two-volume history.

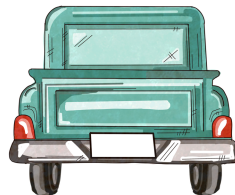
